CHIEF EXECUTIVE'S ADDRESS

Hello Data or Ta-Ta Data?

Data is, quite literally, all around us these days. GDPR sounds ok but General Data Protection Regulation sounds just a bit scary. As the 25th May approaches we will hear a lot more about GDPR one way or another. As the term suggests the era of GDPR will have huge ramifications not just for all companies but also for every person and Irish society as a whole.

As sometimes happens with change the first focus is "How does this affect me?" "Do I have to change how I go about my daily business?" "Is there any way out of this?" And our first reaction sometimes is "not more new things that I have to get used to".

It is important that we are aware of our obligations and responsibilities as professionals working in education and training. But as we undertake training in what GDPR really means, the implications it has for how we do our work will become clearer and over time become embedded in our daily practice.

As this happens I would like to think that our focus will change away from the dread of GDPR and the burden it imposes to something else. And that something else is at the centre of GDPR, namely a learner's rights in relation to personal data. The focus on the rights and needs of learners is at the heart of what we are all about in LWETB. Our five year Strategy Statement has as one of our core values in LWETB that we are learner centred. We place the learner at the centre of everything we do.

GDPR is an opportunity for us to refresh how we put the learner and their needs and rights at the centre of everything we do. What may have been acceptable in the past may not now be considered good practice. As we keep the learner at the centre of our attention we as professionals need to review and revise our work practices so that we can move on and meet the needs of learners in this GDPR era.

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Bus R Us

Longford and Westmeath Education and Training Board is delighted to announce the introduction of a new Bus App called 'BUS'. This new Bus App simplifies the logistics of organising once-off trips for extra-curricular school activities in schools and centres. The transport service is broken down into 8 individual Lots – Mullingar, Athlone, Ballymahon, Lanesboro, Longford, Granard, Castlepollard and Killucan.

BUS r US has gone live in all our schools and centres and trips have been awarded successfully. The Bus App can be operated by using your email address on your PC, iPad or phone. BUS r US is fully compliant with Procurement,

Health & Safety and Child Protection legislation. All buses satisfy roadworthy requirements and bus drivers are fully garda vetted. The organiser is notified on the day of the trip with the full registration details of the nominated bus and a photo of the designated bus driver.

Reports can be generated to monitor trip dates, times, location, security and accounting for all trips and it will ensure good value for money. It is still early days for the rollout of the new App and further enhancements may be introduced in response to feedback from users which will improve the functionality of the Bus App.

General Data Protection Regulation

The new law

The General Data Protection Regulation will come into force across the EU on 25th May 2018, and with it the enactment of the Data Protection Act 2018 here in Ireland.

As a result, in just a few short weeks everybody – staff, learners and students, as well as students' parents or guardians – will have stronger rights in respect of their personal information, including the right to question or challenge how it is used, the right to request a copy of all of it, or even the right to ask to have it corrected or destroyed.

For ETB staff, these rights will impose serious obligations on all of us; to tell people clearly the purpose we will be using their data for, to stick to that purpose, and to safely get rid of that data when it's no longer needed.

Keeping data safe

But above all, we will have to do everything in our power to keep that data safe and secure and out of reach of anyone who is not entitled to see or use it. This means keeping paperwork off work surfaces and noticeboards, locking paperwork away, minimising copying and unnecessary emailing, using strong



passphrases to protect data held on computer, logging off computers when unattended, and being very careful when discussing personal matters in public or on the phone. If we mess up, we are vulnerable to significant financial penalties and lasting reputational damage.

In short, we need to establish and continually practice a culture of treating data as the precious commodity it is, relating as it does so closely to people's lives and personalities.

A snapshot of JCSP in Mullingar Community College 2017/18

This academic year was a busy one for 2nd and 3rd year JCSP students in Mullingar Community College. A total of 27 students participated in the programme which has been running successfully in the school for many years.


For those unfamiliar with the acronym, JCSP (Junior Certificate School Programme) is a social inclusion programme that is aimed at students who are identified as being at risk of becoming socially or academically isolated or leaving school before the Junior Certificate has been achieved. It is a national programme sponsored by the Department of Education and Skills and the National Council for Curriculum and Assessment, and students are awarded a profile folder of achievement upon completion in 3rd year - an official record of their achievements from the Department of Education and Skills.

This year in MCC, under the guidance of co-ordinator Ciara Maguire, JCSP students were involved in six targeted initiatives ranging from film-making to sugar crafting. In addition to these initiatives, students felt engaged with school in a general sense, and the wide variety of subjects covered meant all students benefitted through their involvement with the programme.

The year began for parents with an informal coffee morning, and for students with a team building event in Base Entertainment, Celbridge. There, students worked together to enhance both their confidence and social skills in a number of team centred activities.

Each JCSP student was given a folder to store curricular and cross curricular statements of work, and a core team of teachers for each group was established to monitor progress, both academic and social. As such, students felt engaged with and responsible for their own learning, and were able to see their personal progress on a regular basis.



Throughout the year, JCSP students were encouraged to think about their place in the world. In English class, after studying a novel focusing on a homeless teenager, 2nd year JCSP students discussed how homelessness affects many people and so decided to assemble a box of essentials for the local homeless people they knew of. This was presented to Brian Fagan from the Simon Community, who thanked the students most sincerely for their thoughtfulness.

In addition, throughout the year, each student had their birthday marked with a card and a small gift from their coordinator, as well as postcards home from teachers praising them for their participation in various subjects. As such, students felt a sense of community within JCSP, and were proud to see their effort was being recognised.

In the latter half of the year, more initiatives encouraged students to engage with their learning in a positive manner. Tablets were purchased for a Readalong challenge, in which students signed up to a digital library and read books of their own choosing for pleasure.

JCSP Home Economic students were treated to a morning of sugar crafting with a local chef. The students were shown how to create their own Easter bunnies using fondant, and it has to be said they thoroughly enjoyed the experience and were very proud of their creations.

To finish off the year, parents of 3 JCSP students will be invited to a Celebration of Achievement at which students will be awarded their Final Profile Folders, and an exam pack to ensure they are prepared for their exams.

The JCSP is such a worthwhile programme to have in a school, and students feel rewarded and enhanced in their own learning.

The project was under the direction of Ms. Martina Roache, Chemistry & Science teacher.

Indeed there were three fantastic teams who took part in the BT Young Scientist competition. The first project looked at the impacts of attending crèche in later life with the submission 'To Crèche or not to Crèche'. The second project posed the questions 'Is Clean Country Air a Myth?' This project looked at the effect the prevailing wind has on air pollution. Our third team received a silver medal, their project explored the 'Classroom CO, levels and their Effect on Student Cognitive Performance' Their prize was second place in the Intermediate Chemical, Mathematical and Physical Sciences section. The objectives of their winning project were to determine what the CO, levels within the classrooms are, using sensors, and to use these values as a surrogate for determining if the rooms are adequately ventilated. It also tried to determine if CO, levels are affecting student's cognitive abilities and memory. The achievement by the Transition Year students is a tribute to the emphasis being placed on STEM subjects in Athlone Community College. Principal Eileen Donohoe congratulated all the girls, their parents and their teachers Ms. Roache and Mr. Niall Carty.

Athlone Training Centre

Athlone Training Centre are delighted to be announced as finalists for two awards in this year's Athlone Business Awards the following categories:

This is a fabulous achievement for Athlone Training Centre to be nominated for two awards and is testament to the significant contribution ATC has made over the last 40 years in the Midlands to both individuals and businesses. Athlone Training Centre continually works to identify local business and workforce needs and to successfully provide training and courses to meet industry demands.

Projected figures are in excess of 2000 including an expansion of employer-led apprenticeship programme.

Longford Literacy

Since January, just over 100O adults have participated in part-time courses organised through the literacy service in Longford. This included 575 attending general courses such as Mathematics, Communications, Childcare, Horticulture and Computer Skills. Many courses are certified and lead to QQI certification at levels 1-3. Uncertified courses include courses aimed at helping parents of children attending DEIS schools. These incorporate helping your children with Maths, Internet Safety, Mindfulness and Parenting Skills. Another course was Maths for Apprentices as many apprentices struggle with the Maths demands of their courses and need extra support.

Longford has a very diverse population and there is huge demand for English language classes. Over 300 adults attend English language classes. There are beginner and elementary level classes covering oral, aural and written skills. There are separate classes for people who have never used the cyrillic alphabet, for example, people from an Arabic, Chinese or Russian background.

Another successful programme is Skills for Work which offers part-time courses to employers, employees and self-employed. These courses are scheduled around the working needs of participants so classes may take place in the evenings after work or at different times to suit

shift-workers. Almost 80 people have attended courses to learn or enhance their computer skills for their work needs. Courses have included Internet skills, Word Processing and Spreadsheets for Farmers.

An Open Day was held on the Longford Campus on Thursday 8 March to mark Adult Learners' Week and International Women's Day. It was an opportunity to invite people in to see our facilities, meet staff and find out about the different services and upcoming courses. Visitors could meet staff from the Adult Guidance Service, and staff who organise part-time courses in Adult Literacy, Back to Education Initiative and staff from full-time programmes such as Vocational Training Opportunities (VTOS) and Post Leaving Certificate courses. Most courses which started last September will finish at the end of May so students and tutors are finishing off assignments and tasks for their QQI assessments. However, when all the work is done, we always finish the year with a trip which will be to Bloom in the Phoenix Park this year.

Artists at Work

Those students working towards their QQI Level 4 at present will have the Painting Level 4 module completed by May for assessment. Learners are required to submit 8-10 mounted, finished pieces with relevant support work and written work.

We start the year learning a bit about paint and colour, completing straightforward tasks in colour studies.

Pop Art

Pop Art project where the students research Pop Art and attempt to recreate work by a Pop Artist of their choice. The aim here is to build trust and confidence. There is written work to be completed, based on the Pop Art movement We then jump back in time to Pre-historic Cave Paintings. We do our research and attempt some cave paintings. We texture cardboard with glue and sand, giving an earthy, rocky look and then try our hand at some authentic cave painting. Another historical art journey brings us to Australia and Dot Painting.

Spray Painting

We print images (some will draw their own) on A3 and make paper stencils. On a dry day, we bring spray paint and protective masks, gloves and clothing outside and get creative with the sprays. The process involved here works really well for the Health and Safety section of the module.

Tonal Studies and Portraits

We are presently working on tonal studies and portraits that are a bit trickier. We keep all research materials, thumb nail sketches, drawings and drafts to by compiled into their individual sketchbooks for the end of the year. Towards the latter part of the year we will be doing 3D mask making, and Identity Project, Watercolours, Anti Bullying poster design, Acrylic Pouring and, more than likely, more Spray Art.








LONGFORD YOUTHREACH

The importance of volunteer-led youth clubs and groups in supporting young people and their engagement with the National Quality Standards was recognised in 2017 by a once off equipment grant funded by the Department of Children and Youth Affairs (DCYA). The grant complemented and was additional to the grant scheme already in place and provided annually to various Foróige, Scout Ireland, Youth



Rochfortbridge Club

Clubs, Youth Drama, Guides and other voluntary youth clubs across Longford and Westmeath.

The aim of this grant was to support the work of volunteers, enhance the experience of members and provide vital equipment to local youth clubs and groups. In total, €.35 million was awarded by DCYA and the scheme was administered locally by LWETB on their behalf. The scheme focused on supporting youth work activities at a local level with priority given to clubs and groups serving young people aged 10-21 years. Clubs and groups could apply for the once off grant for the purchase of small scale equipment eg; storage, IT equipment, sporting equipment, arts and drama equipment etc. The maximum amount that could be awarded was €5,000.

Within LWETB 33 clubs and groups, benefiting 1,402 young people weekly were awarded funding under the Scheme, with €122,222 in total allocated. According to Maria Fox, Youth Officer, "the diverse range of grants awarded and equipment purchased highlights the variety of activities and interests of the young people who take part in the various clubs and groups across Longford and Westmeath."
